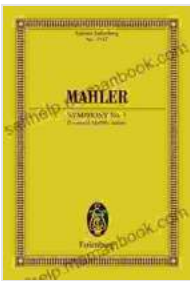

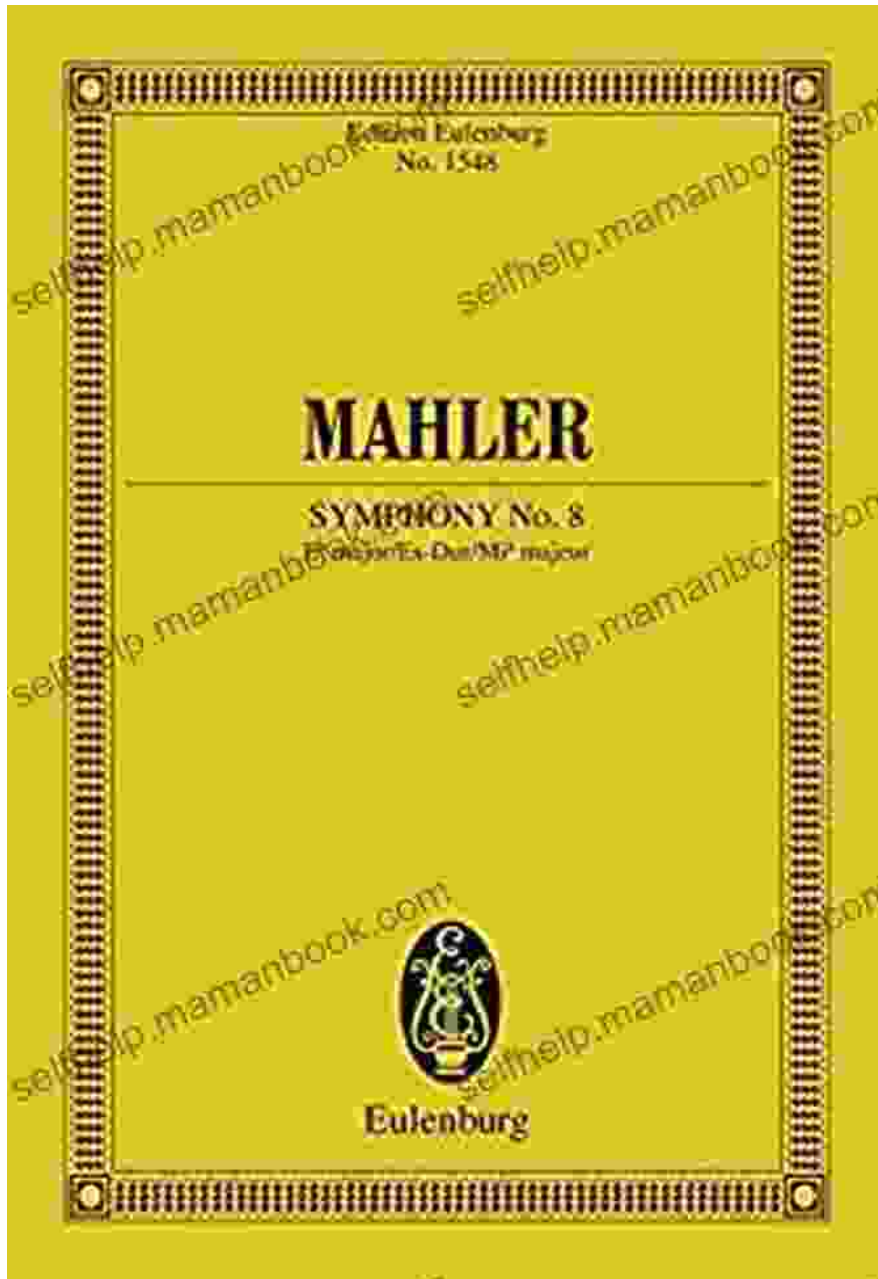

Cover of the Eulenburg Studienpartituren edition of Mahler's Symphony No. 4 in G Major

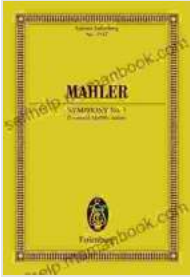
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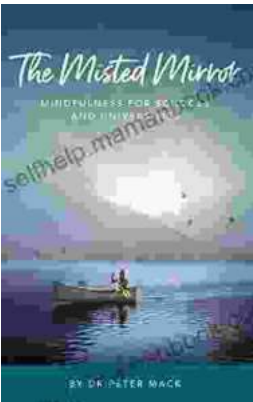
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
